Hug High Does It Again!




club had their own responsibilities. Following the banquet there was a dance.

Student council workshops are designed to inform you about your state councils and teach you leadership skills to use in your schools as leaders. There are many different workshops to attend on the local, state, and national levels.

next night we had an every-council-foritself Olympics, which included such "events" as funny bones, passing oranges with our necks, and the infamous Chubby Bunny competition. Another evening we had a hoedown, and discovered that certain square dances are not as easy as they look! Finally, the last night, we had a banquet and performed our comical council skits, which were followed by singing our council songs around the campfire.

It was inevitable that the last day of NLC had to come. Sadly, we had our final council meetings and visited with our new friends for the last time at camp. For most of the people who went, it was one of the greatest experiences they have had so far in life.

an experience that I will never forget!!!



On July 6th, we left Estes Park at 9:30 a.m. and arrived at the Chicago Greyhound Bus Station at 11:00 a.m. on July 7th. The bus ride home was a long one, but nobody minded. When we finally did pull into the bus station it took at least half an hour to say good-bye.


I will always remember the NASC Conference as one of the greatest times of my life and I am sure the other 39 people and two advisors agree with me.



I've always believed that if you try



Therefore we need all of you, the best student leaders in the state, to apply to be an honor delegate. Applications for honor delegate positions will be mailed to your school in late September. So remember to ask your council advisor and president at that time! Please remember, however, that these applications are due back to either the first or second-vice president (depending on which position you apply for) by November 9. 1990. The following are the honor delegate positions:

From the First-Vice President

- 1. Constitution Committee Memberreviews and makes recommendations on possible constitutional amendments.
- 2. Credentials Committee Memberinterviews and presents a report on possible state student board candidates.
- 3. Honor Council Committee Member- judges honor council books at honor delegate workshop and at state convention.
- 4. Resolutions Committee Memberreviews and makes recommendations on resolutions to present during general session at state convention.
- 5. Discussion Group Leaders (DGL)prepares and presents an informative discussion session.
- 6. Recorder-observes and writes a summary of a discussion group while assisting discussion group leader.

From the Second-Vice President

- 1. Hall of Ideas Chairman-prepares a handout and display of a successful event(s) from his or her school.
- 2. Project Schools Chairman- sends out a state-wide survey to schools on a chosen topic, then compiles the results and distributes at state convention.
- 3. Service Project-provides goods and services needed by the IASC executive board.

Being an honor delegate not only provides one with an informative and enriching experience, but also, it's a BLAST. So come on out and catch that IASC spirit! Apply for that honor delegate position-believe me, there is no way you'll regret it! Don't forget to look for the application soon. Kim and I are looking forward to receiving your applications soon! (By November 9th, of course.)

Some Helpful Hints in Applying for an Honor Delegate Position

Sure, applying for an honor delegate position is taking a big risk. But by following these simple steps while completing your application, things will be simpler. Completing these steps won't guarantee you an honor delegate position, but it will put you a step ahead.

- 1. Send in your completed application as *early* as possible.
- 2. When writing your essay, think about how you can make your contribution to the 1991 state convention and why you are applying for that particular honor delegate position.
- 3. Be sure to either type or write out your essay....so that others may easily read it.

- 4. Be sure to get the required signatures before sending your application.
- 5. Don't get discouraged when you begin to fill out the section entitled "Previous Leadership Experience". Remember: even the most active student council member cannot fill in everything.
- 6. Don't put off filling out your application to the last minute. Take your time and maybe you won't miss some of those important details that could be beneficial to you.

ADVISORS NEED RECOGNITION TOO

Let's face it, without advisors, there wouldn't be student council. Many times the work of advisors wrongly goes unnoticed. Do you know of any outstanding student council advisor who deserves "apat on the back"? Why not nominate him or her for the Warren E. Shull Advisor of the Year Award? The Warren E. Shull award is given by the National Association of Student Councils recognizing those advisors "who go the extra mile".

The first step is to complete the nomination form included in your IASC Executive Director's mailing. Once all forms are reviewed, a winner from Illinois will be chosen to go on to compete for the NASC award.

By nominating your advisor you will be giving your advisor the recognition that he or she deserves, and will also show that you care!

The "Issue" of the Issue

Welcome to the first "Issue" of the Issue column! In this column you express your views as a student council member. Each issue of the Reporter will have a different topic concerning some aspect of student council. Throughout the year, I will be attending district functions and IASC workshops where I will be distributing surveys on student council issues. I will tabulate the results of the surveys and include them in each issue of the Reporter. These surveys will allow you to express your own views and get some insights from other Illinois leaders.

The first survey deals with the issue of student/faculty relations. Student council members are constantly working with the school administration and faculty. Sometimes these relationships are positive, and sometimes not. The purpose of this survey was to find out what techniques different schools use in working with school officials and to exchange ideas on how to make these relationships more productive.

This survey was distributed at the second session of the Millikin workshop. One hundred thirteen people responded.

These are the results of the survey:

How often does someone from your student council meet with your school principal or superintendent?

How would you describe the relationship between your student council and the school faculty?

How would you describe the amount of support that your council receives from

the school faculty and administration?

c. Fair	23%
d. Poor	3%

Do you feel that you are able to voice your opinion to your administration and faculty through student council?

a. Yes		87%

Is there a designated person who represents your student council at faculty or school board meetings?

a. Yes	56%
b. No	44%

Are there any special ways that your student council and faculty communicate?

a. Yes	33%
b. No	67%

What suggestions could you give to other student councils to help them improve their relations with the school faculty/administration? (Here are just a few of the many great ideas that were listed.)

"Do special things for the administration such as secret pals, occasional appreciations, peach for a teach, teacher appreciation picnics...things like that."

"Be sure to voice your opinion no matter how great the fear of rejection is."

"Make regular visits to (your) administration and keep up on things that are going on with them."

"Co-sponsor events with the faculty allowing them to get involved. Working together to reach a goal will help to improve relations."

"Always ask questions and don't be afraid — all they can say about anything is 'no'."

"Respect them and they will respect you...it's a give and take."

"Try to have a good attitude and don't come off as though you can't compromise."

"Hear what they have to say and they'll hear what you have to say also."

"Talk freely to the administrators-they are people and they will listen to your ideas."

"Get to know your administrators and what they expect from you."

The results are positive when it comes to the relationships between student council members and administrators/faculty. According to Millikin delegates, student councils are finding more and more ways to strengthen ties with their administrators.....but there is always room for improvement. Why not discuss different ways your council can try to work with your administration at your next student council meeting? In the end, you will be creating a positive attitude within the school, and who knows, maybe a couple of new friendships as well.
