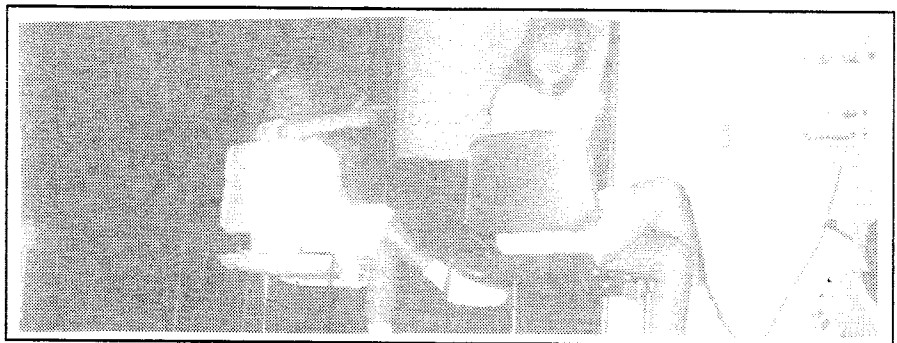


MILLIKIN... WHAT AN EXPERIENCE!

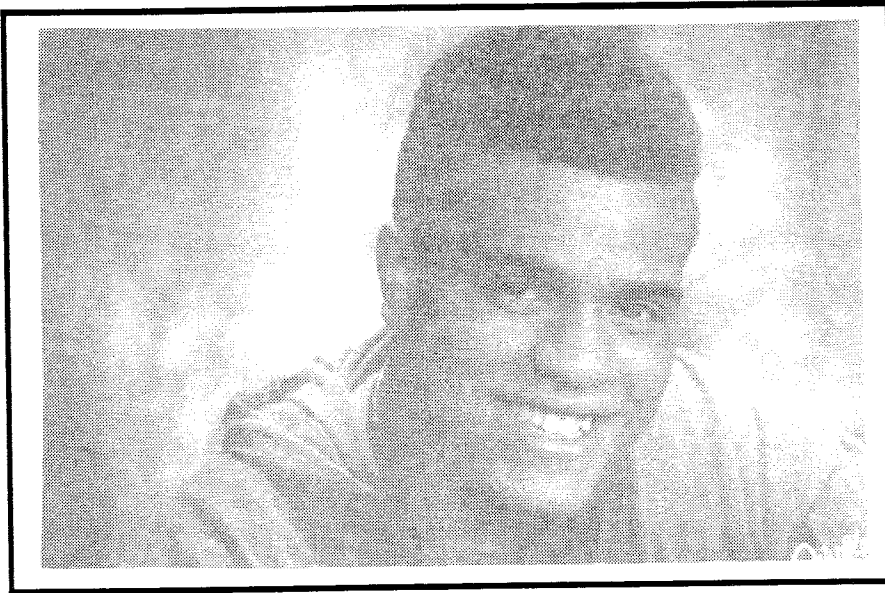
club created its own project to demonstrate what their club represented at Hugg High School.

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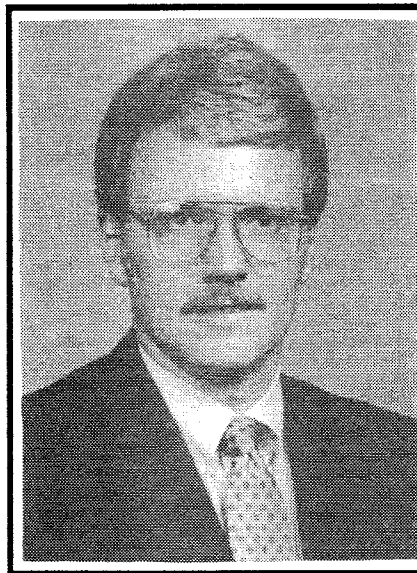
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A SPECIAL TRIBUTE TO GARY ZUM MALLEN

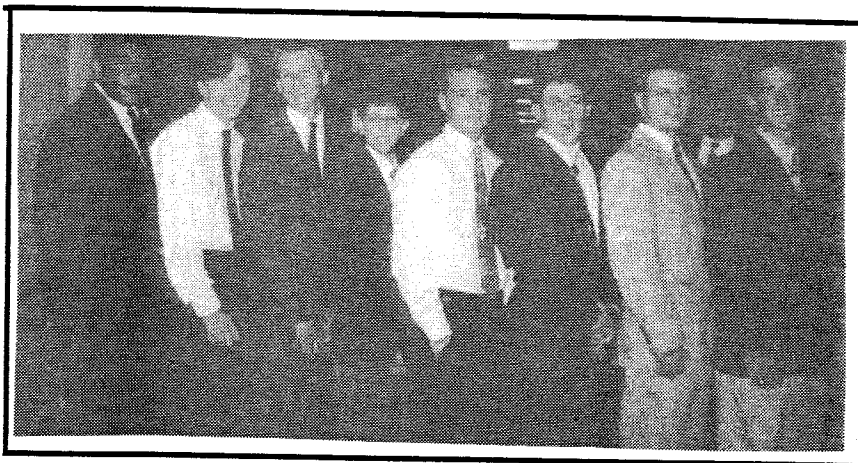

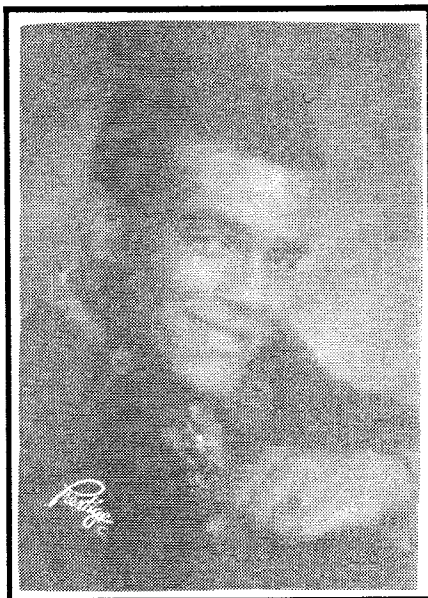

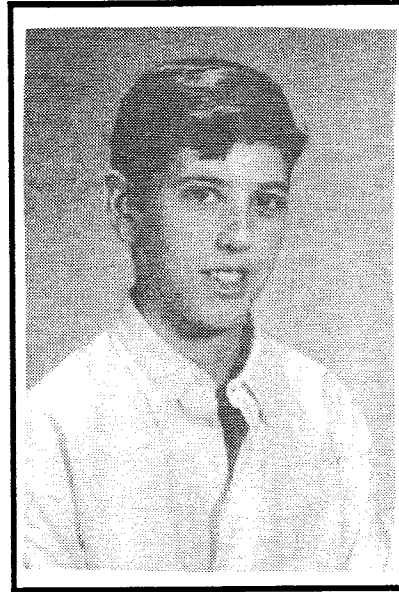

begins.



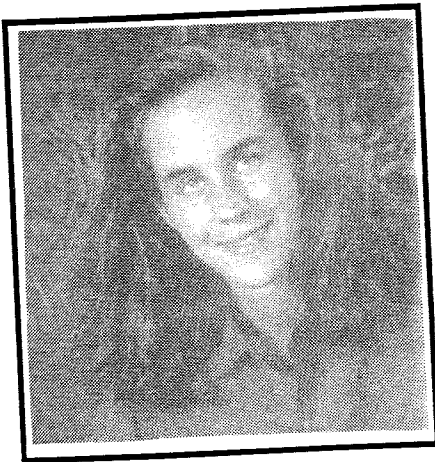
DAVID CHERTOW
