The Leaders of Tomorrow

This year there were two Frosh-Soph workshops. The first was held at East Bay Camp, Bloomington, on November 10th and 11th. The second workshop was held at Rockford College in Rockford. The reason for the two locations was to cut down on the traveling. Students from the southern part of the state attended East Bay, while students from the northern part of the state attended the workshop at Rockford. The format of both workshops was the same.

The delegates started to arrive at 11:00 a.m. for registration; at 12:30 p.m. lunch was served.

At the first general session Mr. Gary "Zoom" ZumMallen, workshop director, welcomed everyone. He then introduced Ed Phelps, Executive Secretary of the IASC. Mr. Phelps spoke briefly on leadership and the upcoming activities.

The delegates were then asked to form a circle and were given the name of an animal. The delegates with the same animal formed a group for the entire weekend.

Each group did icebreakers and thought of a school name, mascot

and colors. Some groups even made up cheers. The groups reported back with someone from each group explaining the name, mascot, and colors they had chosen.

Delegates took a recreation break. Since the weather was superb, Rockford delegates went outside to play touch football and frishee

After recreation, delegates went to their council meetings to elect officers and discuss the Constitution and the Areas of Authority. The delegates then had dinner.

At the 2nd general session, Mr. Phelps talked about leadership theory and the development of leadership qualities. Afterwards, the delegates held council meetings. In these meetings, they discussed the committee system and project planning. When the meetings were over, delegates watched the movie "Jaws".

Sunday morning, after breakfast, delegates attended their final council meeting. They talked about calendar development and used "brainstorming" techniques to think of fund raising activities.

The last general session began with Rod Schlottman, NCD President, leading delegates in singing "Boom Chicka Boom" and other songs made famous by the IASC. He was followed by IASC President Steve Sakach, who talked about IASC activities. The other state officers, Jeri Henderson, 1st Vice-President; Janet Goodwin, 2nd Vice-President; Jeff Hawkins, Secretary; and Alan Edstrom, Convention Secretary, also talked about their positions and what a person can do to become an active part of the IASC state convention. Mr. Lou Nettlehorst, Wheeling High School, talked about the Illinois Citizenship Experience, cosponsored by District #214 and the IASC. President Sakach concluded the general session by talking about the National Association of Student Councils conference trip to Colorado this coming summer.

The freshmen and sophomores who attended the workshops have learned the basics of leadership and are now ready to use that knowledge in their own councils.

McKendree Goes National

Ninety-six Student Council and National Honor Society members from the United States, Canada, and Puerto Rico, attended the National Leadership Training Center. The national workship was held at McKendree College in Lebanon, Illinois, for the first time.

The staff, who were also from various parts of the country, arrived on Friday night and Saturday morning. Since the national workshop was run like the state

workshop, staff meetings were spent orienting the new people to the program.

The delegates arrived on Sunday afternoon. After registering and unpacking, delegates waited for dinner to be served. Sunday night was spent interviewing roommates, telling others about themselves in small groups, getting into clubs and having club pictures taken. At the general session, delegates were greeted by a representative from the college, and by co-directors Pat Brown and Gary ZumMallen, staff was then introduced. Mr. Ed Phelps, consultant for the workshop, gave a rundown

on the things to happen. The delegates then went to club meetings to play the name game. Clubs were given a problem and they had to think of a solution. They were then given a set of Tinker Toys to build their solution. The clubs brought their solution back to the general session and explained it to everyone. After the general session there were dorm meetings and closing led by the J.C.'s.

At Monday's general sessions, Mr. Phelps' talked about group participation and group reactions, delegates were then broken up into groups of ten to play mipps and wars, slips, and headbands to reinforce what Mr. Phelps had talked about. Delegates, after a short break, went to club meetings where they elected officers and talked about general sessions. Club members had the chance to join committees which interested them.

A new dimension was added; each Senior Counselor led a general session. The sessions dealt with structural information, communications, decision making, leadership, and self-worth.

Delegates also spent a day at Six Flags over Mid-America, in St. Louis. Terry Giroux, Director of the National Association of Secondary School Principals, joined the staff and delegates for a day to remember. He was also the guest speaker at the banquet on Thursday night.

Delegates also participated in a talent show, all-school sports night, with a disco following the banquet.

Delegates left on Friday morning having acquired new friends, new ideas and renewed enthusiasm to help their schools. They also learned about their leadership style, how to run a meeting, areas of authority and the constitution.

NED Starts the Year Off Right!

On September 20, 1979, Benet Academy held the first District Workshop of the school year. The theme of the workshop was Student Council: People to People. Registration began at 3:30 p.m. with 210 students receiving name tags and a program of the evening events. After everyone was registered, Father David lead the first General Session with a talk on communication. After the General Session, delegates eagerly waited in line for dinner to be served.

Next, students from various schools in NED lead seminars. Topics ranged from "Goal Setting and Evaluation" to "Communication - The Non-Verbal Agenda." After the seminars, delegates, got together for one last time in the evening. Everyone left the workshop with a good feeling of accomplishment.

The Trials and Tribulations of Closing a High School

Niles Township, District 219, including three divisions, East, North, and West, is unique. In September of 1980, Niles East will be the first high school in our area to be closed because of declining enrollment. It is predicted that many other high schools will also be closing in the near future.

Many questions arose in the preparation of the closing: 1) To which school, North/West, will the East students, teachers, and administrators be assigned? 2) Will the East students be assigned a new counselor, and will they compete against different students in class rank? 3) How will student activities be handled?

"Closing committees" consisting of administrators, teachers, parents, and students were formed to solve these transitional problems. Believe it or not, the biggest problem was student council, and is yet to be solved. What happens to a student who has worked hard in council for three years and would have been president of his school during his senior year, and suddenly his

school is closed? All three schools in the district had different ideas for the transition of the East president. Niles West's idea was that the East president serve the second semester, and the West president serve first semester (that is, if the East president attends West). The Niles North council favored the East student acting as the North vice-president, and after six weeks, running against the North president in an in-council election. Lastly, the East council wanted co-presidents; to whichever school, West/North, the East student attended, he would act jointly with the other president.

Each plan had its pros and cons. A major obstacle we found was trying to explain to the parents and School Board that student council is different in every school. The students were against achieving commonality between the North and West councils. The two councils differ greatly, in everything from their names (Niles West Student Representative Assembly and Niles North Student Congress) to the method in which students

became members (petition at West, election at North). The constitutions, by-laws, and the entire structure of the councils share few similarities.

How the Niles Township student councils will be run in 1980 is still up in the air. The presidency is only one problem of the entire assimilation of the East students into the North and West councils:

1) Who will serve as other officers and positions such as PTSA and School Board rep? and 2) Who will act as chairmen of various standing committees? are other unanswered questions.

If anyone has any ideas for solving some of our problems faced by our district concerning the transition of the student councils, PLEASE contact me. And if any other district is faced with the problem of declining enrollment/school closings, our student council is ready to help!


