Pop Tabs

Our State Service project this year is collecting pop tabs for the Ronald McDonald House Charity. If your student council has not started this fundraiser, I encourage you to do so. It's a great way to help many children and their families and it is very easy to start. All you have to do to start is provide a box or any container and start collecting pop tabs. After your collection drive you can drop them off in a collection container. These collection containers are in the shape of a house at schools, committee and city groups, and other local organizations in your area. You can also contact a Ronald McDonald House near your to ask about getting your own house for collection at your school. Another way is to create and decorate your own collection container. This year at the state convention, all schools who took part in the state service project can display their creative container designs. Student Councils will also be able to bring in the tabs they have collected over the year to be weighed at convention through a partner of RMHC.

Keep the Cans

In conjunction with Rexam, a company called United Scrap Metal recycles aluminum cans for charity. Anything recycled from, or on behalf of, the charity, USM donates all of the funds back to RMHC. Registration will be limited so don't delay in sending in your form. Students must have attended previously attended either the IASC Summer Workshop, or a Drive-In Workshop in order to be eligible to attend Advanced Workshop.

Cost of the workshop for IASC members, with registration due by **January 7**, **2015** is \$160.00 per delegate.

CALL FOR AMENDMENTS

All member schools are invited to review the constitution and handbook, and submit any changes you believe are necessary by February 2, 2015.

Every proposed amendment will be reviewed by both the IASC Executive Board as well as the Constitution Committee. The amendments will be posted on the IASC website two weeks prior to the convention. All proposed amendments will be discussed at the 81st IASC State Convention and will require two-thirds vote for constitution amendment passage and a simple majority vote for bylaw changes.

All amendments must be submitted on the official IASC Amendment form, and must be submitted to IASC President, Matt Bourke, no later than **February 1, 2015**.
