

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



Getting to Know Linda Pickett


Linda Pickett was one of the recipients of the 2014 Illinois Award. Mrs. Pickett has been involved with student council since her high school career in the 1970's, including serving as the student body President her senior year. She then later became an Assistant Student Council Advisor during her first year at Columbia High School and took over the organization as the lead advisor 12 years ago. Her commitment and involvement has led her to being a recipient of the 2014 Illinois Award.

Upon winning this award Mrs. Pickett shared that she felt honored to be recognized for this award at the IASC State Convention and was pleased and humbled to be awarded at the same time as Kyle Gordon, who has been her mentor since her involvement in student council. Winning this award was a total surprise for Mrs. Pickett. She said, "I've seen previous advisors earn this for their dedication to their councils and knew it was a significant and very special recognition but knew very little about it. So, yes, I was totally surprised." Mrs. Pickett also shared with us that the students who have stepped up to assist her in making CHS a better place for everyone played the most important part of her earning the 2014 Illinois Award. She said, "Without them, none of it would have been possible."

Mrs. Pickett may have been surprised to win this award but it is no surprise that she has won other awards in her past for her hard work. She was previously recognized as the Kaskaskia District of Student Council Advisor of the Year. Along with being awarded at both the district and state level, she has also served as a 13 year member of the Waterloo School Board. Her achievements do not stop there; she has also been honored at her school for Teacher of the Month six different times, which is an honor chosen by other teachers and co-workers.

Looking back at all the great memories Mrs. Pickett had with student council she chose to share this recap of a moment with us: "There are so many memories that this is very difficult to choose a favorite. I will have to go with attending the KDSC Convention held in 2008 at Centralia High School. I attended my first Advisor's meeting and was sitting at the table when they asked for a volunteer to host the district convention. The advisors at Centralia assured me that everything was on a disk so it would not be a difficult task... I just needed to have a student will-ing to volunteer. I went out and met my students during lunch and Zeke stepped up and said he'd love to do it so there we went... this was the beginning of students at CHS getting involved in the district and we have held a district office ever since. We had a great convention and I had a great group of students that led this entire convention." "Through that experience, I realized that my students had much more potential than I could ever imagine. At that time, I encouraged students to be more involved on all levels to the point where I have a student on the state board for the first time! I was just invited to the 5-year class reunion for Zeke's class held over the Christmas holiday break and was the only teacher invited to attend. I was so honored and so pleased to see the students and their accomplishments now that most are college graduates. The bond that I first developed with this group of students was an inspiration to me. Since that time, I have seen numerous outstanding students develop leadership skills which have made a significant impact on them and on myself. I am so grateful for the opportunity to work with high school students in this capacity. Life changing.... many significant memories that I will never forget!"

Mrs. Mihalik was in awe that she was selected out of all advisors in the IASC. In March 2013, Mihalik was selected as the WGN Teacher of the Month, and was nominated by Kylie Reed; the same student who nominated her for this award. Mihalik shares with us, "Sometimes we have people who enter our lives and completely change us for the better. They make being an advisor easy and extremely fulfilling. To receive that award at the last IASC convention I would be attending for a while, surrounded by Kylie and my graduating seniors, was the cherry on top of what I believe has been an extremely rewarding life in the student council world."

The convention is the annual business meeting of the IASC member schools, who elect the new state officers, and vote on any constitutional amendments. By the end of the convention, you're sure to reinvigorated with the power of student leadership, and will be ready to return to your schools to share your experiences with others.
