

IASC Local Council Feature

The Student Council at Hononegah Community High School in Rockton, Illinois hosted their fourth annual I Pink I Can 5K to raise money for the Making Strides Against Breast Cancer fund in the American Cancer Society. The event is a glow-in-the-dark run and begins as the sun sets.

Each year this event has been hosted, the Student Council has partnered with the Baking Club, the Girls Cross Country Team, the Men's Track coaches and the Booster Club to offer this community event. Each organization contributes their expertise to the event: the Baking Club provides after race snacks; the Men's



Track coaches run the timing system; the Cross Country team sets and marks the course; and the Student Council handles the registration and the volunteers that staff the route acting as cheerleaders for the event.

The October 17 event drew 277 participants, and over half of them were community members. This year the event raised \$3100 and the four-year total donated to the American Cancer Society is \$19,700.

Even if you are 100% certain that you intend on running for a position on the State Board, you may not publically disclose this decision to anyone or participate in any pre-campaigning until you have been interviewed by either the current State Board or the Credentials Committee; however, you may contact the officer holding the position you intend to run for to seek more information.

Information not covered in this article will either be addressed in the email your advisor will receive or you may contact Second Year Advisor at Large Mrs. Jerilyn Hawkins, who will answer any questions regarding the application process that you may have.
